### Responds to September 11, 2001

What were you doing the morning of Tuesday, September 11, 2001? I was getting ready to process into morning Mass when I was told the news for the first time. Initially, I thought the person had made a mistake, but before I could get back to my office after the Mass was finished, I was given the rest of the news of the second tower attack. Later as I watched the news on television I heard of the Pentagon attack and then the downed plane in Pennsylvania. My heart sank and my head was swimming seeking sense of it all. I turned to prayer and then it was obvious, we all need to pray, as a community gathered.

So what did the St. Francis community do on September 11? We prayed! We responded as Christians do, in Jesus name we acted. On Tuesday at 2:00 p.m. the school children with many of their parents gathered for a prayer service. Later that evening we held a Mass in the church at 7:00 p.m. and all Masses that week were offered to ask God's blessing on the victims in the buildings and surrounding regions, on the victims families, on us the larger national victims and on the world. We sought conversion for the attackers still living that they would embrace the truth and peace of Jesus and give up their evil ways. We prayed for world peace.

On the following Sunday we placed the Easter Candle, the symbol of Jesus' Resurrection and Life, in the sanctuary of the church and asked you to sign your names to the book of prayers for the victims which we later sent to Mayor Giuliani of New York City. The school children also undertook the opportunity to support the rescue teams by sending them new shirts and socks to change into during their breaks in between those long hard search missions, which still continue today. St. Francis parish did respond to the attacks against us on September 11, 2001, and as brothers and sisters in the Lord we still do respond –



with our prayers and support.

### A Chance for Survival

Alcoholism or other substance abuse can cause countless problems...in the life of the addicted person, and for their family. If not controlled it can lead to tremendous difficulties, and even death. If you or your loved one suffers from alcoholism or other drug abuse, you are not alone. Help is closer than you think.

St. Francis of Assisi Church has recently initiated a program that can be of help. You can now call the parish and be referred to another parishioner who has lived and worked through a similar experience, and who has offered to be part of this special ministry. That person will help you or family members by assisting you in finding local program support. You will also be given the opportunity to borrow an information kit that will provide video and audio tapes, and literature to inform and guide family members and friends of those with an alcohol or drug problem.

So often people don't know where to turn. Now there is a way to begin. Call the parish health line number, 821-2115 and leave your first name and phone number. You will be contacted by one of our staff and then referred to one of our supportive parishioners. All this will be done with the strictest confidence so that your anonymity is respected. Don't let fear keep you from coming forward. Your church is here to be of support to you and your family.

### Support Group for Unemployed Meets a Real Need!!!

Since mid-September unemployed persons from the parish have been getting together weekly for support and networking. At least 22 people have participated in the group since then. The creative energy among the participants is amazing. Many have had high level jobs and many have more than one degree. There are years of valuable experience between them. However, there has also been participation by those who are seeking to reenter the job market after years at home, and by those who have been hourly employees.

One of the great things to come out of the meetings is the formation of Father Jim's Job Fair. This is a place where employers within the parish and people who may know of job openings at their place of work, can link with parishioners who are seeking employment. The hope is that parish employers would be willing to take a serious look at our parishioners who are looking for work, take into account their skills, education and gifts, and look to see if there is a possibility of hiring them. Some may need to learn a specific job, but they may already have the basic knowledge and experience that would assure their success in the position. What is needed is a little consideration for the time to learn the job and a willingness to help out one of our parish family.

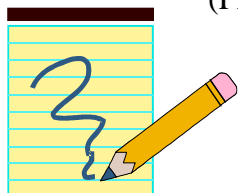

## ***RADIX Challenges Youth***

On October 27 and 28 St. Francis Parish celebrated World Youth Day with the youth ministry team known as RADIX. The entire weekend was jam-packed with celebrations including special liturgies, dramas, parent & youth presentations, a family pot-luck dinner, a parish breakfast, and a youth event complete with a pizza party for those in grades 6 through 12.

Since appearing at World Youth Day in 1993 with Pope John Paul II, RADIX has traveled all over the country challenging and encouraging families to embrace their Catholic faith. Doug Barry and Eric Genius, the dynamic duo behind RADIX, use drama, music, comedy, and a no-punches-pulled style of speaking to spread the message of Christ.

RADIX performed two dramas during the weekend. One was entitled *The Martyrs* and told the stories of St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Thomas More, and St. Maria Goretti. The other drama was entitled *The Passion of Christ* and focused on the suffering and death of Jesus. The youth felt the dramas were “really good” and “very moving.” “The dramas were really powerful,” sixth grader Johanna Grum said. “They kind of overcame you.”

Doug Barry was very clear in his introduction to the youth on Sunday night, however, when he said he and Eric were “not here to entertain you. We want to make you think.” A single purpose was evident throughout the weekend: RADIX was here to challenge us. The word

“challenge” means to invite to a contest, to confront, to call into question. That’s just what RADIX did. They challenged the music we listen to, the movies and TV programs we watch, and the clothes we wear. They kept asking whether or not something would offend Jesus. If our answer was “Yes, it would offend Jesus” then, RADIX pointed out, we should not listen to it, watch it, or wear it. Some liked the message and some didn’t.

“A lot was good,” said seventh grader Sabrina Lividini, “but I disagree with some of it. I think you should be able to wear whatever you want. The boys should just control themselves.”

Seventh grader Claire McGinn said, “I think if a person with strong morals watches a movie that has something bad in it they can just say ‘Oh, that’s a bad part’ and it won’t effect them.”

When asked to describe what he thought about RADIX’s message, Brian Hunt, who is in seventh grade, replied, “It was

truthful. It got down deep.” Elaine Cordeiro, also in seventh grade, said, “They wanted us to think twice about what we’re doing because every choice we make is really important.” Sixth grader Rachel Thomas said, “You need to live like Jesus wants you to.”

### ***What exactly was RADIX challenging us to do?***

Jack Falahee, a seventh grader, said, “They challenged us to live a better way. We need to take a more serious look into what we are watching and listening to and see what it really means.” Johanna Grum thought RADIX was challenging us “not to follow others if we don’t agree with them.”

When asked why we find RADIX’s challenge so difficult to live out, Rachel Thomas replied, “Because you have to give up things. It’s hard because you are used to doing it.” Jack Falahee said, “Everyone likes that stuff and it’s hard to go against the flow.” Brian Hunt agreed, “We’re used to it and it’s hard to avoid.” “We’re surrounded by it,” Alan Carroll observed.

Although some may not agree with everything they said, most will agree that RADIX accomplished their goal. Elaine Cordeiro, who didn’t like everything she heard, summed it up by saying, “They wanted to get us to think about it and I guess they did.”

# Preparing for the Sacrament of Reconciliation

Preparation for the Sacrament of Reconciliation, also called confession or penance, consists of parent and child meetings, education on the sacrament in the classroom, and follow-up by parents at home, reviewing faith concepts and teaching the act of contrition to the children.

This year at St. Francis, 160 children prepared for and celebrated the Sacrament in early December.



During the parent and child meeting, children were invited to learn of God's love, rich in forgiveness and kindness, by acting out the story of the prodigal son. Clay was molded into the figures and the parts from the bible story divided and read among family members.

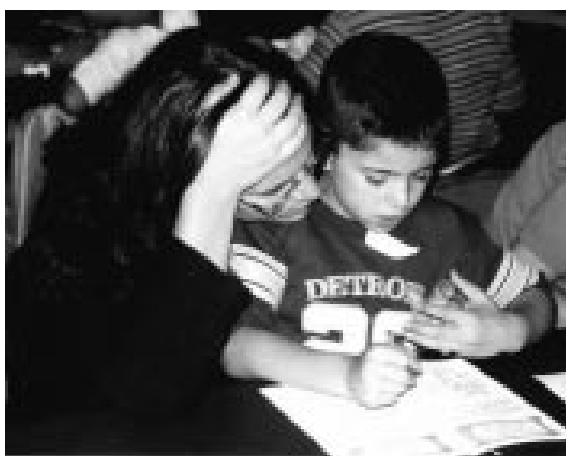


“Forming a conscience” can be a difficult concept for children. Introduced here at the meeting, some time was spent looking at how we make decisions, making good choices, and thinking about the end result, so that what will happen because of our choice is good too. Our choices and actions determine who we are. Created for greatness, human by nature and divine by adoption, we are called to continual conversion by God. God calls us to share fully in the life for which we are destined as the children of God. Parents and children renewed their baptismal vows to conclude the first meeting.



Concepts touched on at the first meeting were explored further in the classroom. When parents and children came together for the second meeting, the “how to” of the Sacrament was reviewed.

Sin is a deliberate choice to do wrong. Sin goes against our very nature as a child of God and hurts our friendship with God and others. All of us, at one time or another, do choose to do wrong. We ask for forgiveness from God and from the community in the person of the priest in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.



With the help of their parents, children began to learn an act of contrition (a prayer of sorrow with intention to do good).

Preparation was completed with an examination of conscience and prayer in anticipation of celebrating the Sacrament. Parents and older siblings were encouraged to also celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation at the time the child receives for the first time.

## Business Manager's Report to the Parish

Since my last report to you in May of this year, a number of capital projects have been undertaken, but at a somewhat slower pace than in the previous year. Believe it or not, the West Parking Lot project (seemingly the project that never ends) is edging closer to completion; signs have been reinstalled, trees and shrubs replaced, and the outlet drain from the detention pond in front of the Church reopened. We are awaiting installation of protective grates on the inlets to the original pond and the securing of grates on both outlet structures and then we will be able to wrap up this project. We hope that this will have occurred by the time you receive this report.

Our Religious Education Office, located in the School just off the "Fishbowl", was renovated during the summer, with new office space created and climate control improvements. As part of this project, the Parish Library was closed temporarily. We expect that, as part of a planned renovation to the Church, a new Parish Library will be established in a room of its own, off the rear vestibule of the Church. Thank you for your continuing patience as we pursue a resolution.

Another major project undertaken this past summer was the replacement of the wood frames supporting the stained glass windows of the Church overlooking the PAC Plaza. Despite frequent painting of the frames, the wood had rotted almost to the point of being unable to support the weight of the stained glass. The frames were replaced over a period of about six days in July, and have been repainted for protection during the winter. However, our painter reports that the frames supporting the matching set of windows on the west side of the Church are also showing evidence of rotting, and are unlikely to last more than another year or two, so we will likely have to replace those frames next summer.

In the School, summertime projects included the replacement of old, single-pane windows in our Kindergarten and First Grade classrooms, and at the east end of the Middle School hallway, with new double-pane, low-e energy efficient windows. Thanks to the generous donation of a school parent, we have also added air conditioning to our second and third grade classrooms, which will be espe-

cially appreciated at the beginning and end of each school year. A special thanks is again due parishioners supporting the various school development efforts, for without their support, none of these improvements would have been possible.

Another summertime project was an upgrade to the K-1 playground, but this project did not go as well. The contractor installing the new swingset hit a drain tile from the playground to the street, resulting in the loss of drainage and a lot of standing water on that playground. As this is written, we are seeking a drainage contractor to come and rebuild the drain line so that the playground will again be usable.

As to what is on the agenda in the future, some of the things we are currently working on include improved lighting in the Middle School; improved windows in several locations throughout the School, including grade 4-8 classrooms and the Gym; and installation of a sump and pump in the elevator pit to reduce standing water there. Some minor enhancements to the Church will also be undertaken, most likely in 2002, as we try to make our worship space more meaningful, as well as more accessible for all our parishioners. As we

have said in the past, several of our facilities here are nearing 50 years of age, and upkeep was not always done as it should have been. We continue to attempt, within the constraints of our financial capability, to do what we can to improve the facilities used by all, as rapidly as we can.

Something that we can all be proud of is a "Waste Knot" award for 2001 which was received by the Parish and the School from Washtenaw County. That bright green dumpster behind the PAC has accumulated many tons of cardboard and paper products in the two years we have had it, and we appreciate the continuing efforts of those involved in events at the Parish and School to recycle paper products there whenever possible.

Again, thank you for your continuing support. As always, if there is an issue close to your heart which we have not yet resolved, it may be because we do not know of it. Please give me a call, or drop me a note, to offer any suggestions, comments, or questions.

# Halloween Blessings!

## *Parishioners Respond Generously to Candy Drive*

Costumes, treats, and hospitality mark the end of the month of October. Children dress up and going door to door as beggars, ask for treats making Halloween a favorite children's holiday. Hospitality, aflame with the love of Christ, extends the invitation to love by making present God's love in kindness and generosity. Kindness and generosity describes the response of the parishioners of St. Francis to the call for Halloween candy by Sacred Heart Seminary.

Sacred Heart Seminary is located in the center of Detroit and reaches out to a neighborhood made up of families in need. Since the mid-1960's, the seminarians have dressed in costumes, "nothing scary that might frighten the kids" and have given out candy and prayer cards while socializing with the children. Cider for the kids and coffee for the parents and adults who accompany the children are provided. "This isn't just about candy," said Jim Smalarz, a second-year theology student at Sacred Heart Major Seminary. "It's about bringing Christ

to the kids. This is part of our ministry here to the community (Michigan Catholic, Oct. 26)."

St. Francis parishioners for the past three years have donated a hefty portion of the bags

of candy which are given out to these children near Sacred Heart Seminary. Our own parish involvement began in 1999 when October 31 (Halloween) fell on a Sunday. The children of the parish were invited to dress up in their costumes and be part of the entrance procession at the start of Mass. The children were also reminded that as followers of Christ, love is not about getting, but about giving. On Halloween that year, St. Francis parish children were invited to bring a bag of candy for children in less fortunate circumstances and offer the candy during t

he food collection that occurs regularly during the Mass. Hundreds of children participated, lining up to process in, and abundantly overflowing the basket for food at the offertory.

In the years since, the weekend before Halloween, while not dressing up like that first Halloween collection, the invitation is given to children and parishioners to bring candy. When Fr. Jim and Fr. Jay call for the candy to be brought up, hundreds still come forward. This year, St. Francis parishioners donated about 600 bags of candy. That's approximately 10,000 pieces of candy. "It's due to the generosity of parishes such as St. Francis of Assisi, Ann Arbor, that candy is definitely not in short supply (Michigan Catholic, Oct. 26)" and enables an outreach to a community where Christ is made present.

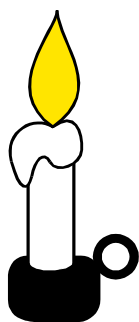

## Remembering Our Loved Ones

Over 200 people, young and old, gathered on the evening of November 2nd for the All Souls Day Liturgy of Remembrance for those who were buried from our parish during this past year. Our pastor, Father Jim invited those who were mourning to, “take God’s hand and walk

with Him.” He spoke of the reason for our life here on earth, and that our role is to love others and to build up God’s Kingdom. He reminded us of the words at the end of the book of Solomon, that “*Love is stronger than death,*” that love does not end when our family member or dear friend passes on. We are not separated from them. Our belief in the Communion of Saints consoles us and offers us hope.



A very moving part of the liturgy was the Litany of Remembrance. The names of the deceased were spoken and then a loved one placed a lit candle representing that deceased person in a large white bowl filled with sand. As dozens of names were called, and dozens of candles placed sided-by-side in the white bowls, it was a reminder of the All Saints Day reading from the book of Revelation about those who wore the white gowns gathered around the throne of God. Together the candles gave a beautiful light, and offered hope to all present at the liturgy.

Afterwards, the assembly was invited to a reception hosted by the members of the *St. Frances Bereavement Support Group*. Delicious cookies had been lovingly baked by eight grade Confirmation Candidates for the reception. Many stayed for the cookies and to visit with family members and others from the parish.

## Reaching out to address the violence in our world

The foundation of Catholic Education has always been, and will always be, to teach our children how to live a Christian-centered life.

**D**arrell Scott is the father of Rachel Joy Scott, one of the victims at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999. His son, Craig, was in the library that day and watched as 10 of his classmates were gunned down. Two of his closest friends died beside him, and his sister, Rachel, was killed just outside the library door, a few yards away.

Shots that pierced Columbine High School tore our hearts apart, yet provided a national wake-up call to all Americans. On that tragic day, Rachel Scott and others when asked, "Do you believe in God?" said "YES." Her life on earth ended moments later, but her story has reached around the world.

Darrell Scott is the leading spokesperson from the Columbine tragedy addressing the rise of violence among teens. Who could have predicted the last rounds of high school shootings? What can be done? Where are the answers? Darrell believes, as Rachel wrote just one month before she was killed, "compassion is the greatest form of love that humans have to offer...I have this theory that if and person can go out of their way to show compassion, then it will start a chain reaction."

Darrell Scott believes that kindness is the most effective antidote for violence, but it comes at a very huge price. Darrell has spoken to millions of people over the last years through television, radio, and the press. Please plan to join us in April when he joins us to discuss how we as a Church community can reach out to help those who are troubled. And to create a culture where kindness rather than bullying is cool.
